

Curriculum Intent

The Japanese department seeks to develop ambitious and resilient linguists who recognise their common humanity and strive to gain inter-cultural understanding and respect. We aim to provide an understanding of basic Japanese communications on themes of identities and healthy living and two types of syllables, Hiragana and Katakana and their spelling rules, in order to be able to utilise the knowledge and communicate in authentic situations on their exchange visits and prepare for the challenges of developing the language at a higher level in KS4 and the Sixth Form. We intend to develop our students to be inquisitive and curious about the culture, knowledgeable and understanding, open-minded and courageous as they personally develop through their learning of Japanese.
