## **Curriculum Intent**

**GCSE English Language** provides appropriate stretch and challenge whilst ensuring, as far as possible, that the assessment and texts are accessible to the full range of students. The AQA specification enables students of all abilities to develop the skills they need to read, understand and analyse a wide range of different texts covering the 19th, 20th and 21st century time periods as well as to write clearly, coherently and accurately using a range of vocabulary and sentence structures. Students will also develop their speaking and listening skills.

**GCSE English Literature** will inspire, challenge and motivate every student, no matter what their level of ability. Students will engage with language and structure as well as themes and ideas, alongside covering a range of contextual content, designed to support their own readings of the texts. Students will become critical readers, with the ability to support their ideas with textual reference and the use of subject terminology.
