### SYNOPSIS OF CONTENT:

Students study thirteen texts from different times and genres. Students have the opportunity to study texts in translation and consider the various ways in which different cultures deal with common experiences. The course is divided into 4 parts: Paper 1: guided literary analysis (2 hours 15 minutes). Two unseen passages from different literary forms each accompanied by a question. Paper 2: comparative essay (1 hour 45 minutes). Students write an essay based on two works studied in the course. Essay: 1200-1500 word essay. Students will be asked to develop a line of enquiry of their own choice in relation to one of the works studied. Individual Oral: (15 minutes)

### WHY STUDY THIS SUBJECT?

The course will encourage students to think critically about a wide range of texts. In addition, it will develop students' ability to write accurate and well structured essays. As with all IB subjects, the study of IB English places emphasis on students working independently to prepare and research texts.

### HOW IS IT ASSESSED?

Paper 1: Examination- guided literary analysis (35%). Paper 2: Examination- comparative essay (25%). Essay: Coursework 1200-1500 word essay (20%). Individual Oral: an individual oral commentary and discussion. Students prepare an individual oral with two works studied in relation to a global issue present in both of them (25%).

### ADDITIONAL INFORMATION / CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

It is recommended that students purchase their own copies of the texts studied.

### SPECIFIC MATRICULATION REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the Sixth Form matriculation, students need to have a grade 6 or better in GCSE English Language and GCSE English Literature. The student should enjoy reading and be aware that essay writing is a key feature of the course, as is the ability to present oral work coherently and cogently.
